If it's true that "life is what happens when you're busy making other plans," then 2025 was the liveliest year in recent memory for AACI.

Significant shifts in the public policy landscape posed unprecedented challenges that required nimble responses from AACI. Throughout the year, we redirected resources to support our members amid uncertainty and upheaval.

As **Dr. Robert A. Winn**, director of VCU Massey Comprehensive Cancer Center, entered his final year as AACI president, he refocused his Inclusive Excellence Initiative in response to AACI member needs. Activities throughout the year included focus groups on cancer centers' global oncology programs and the introduction of Cancer Center Director Town Halls. The town hall meetings were held virtually twice a month as a forum for cancer center leaders to discuss changes in leadership at the National Institutes of Health and National Cancer Institute, new government policies, and federal funding for cancer research.

To keep AACI members apprised of these changes and amplify stories about the impact of cancer research, AACI launched the Defending Cancer Research Digest. The digest served as a complement to the monthly AACI Update newsletter, with a focus on local and national media coverage of recent federal policy changes and their effects on patients with cancer. AACI spoke out on behalf of the cancer center community through its Commentary editorial series, official policy statements, and social media.

Though the public policy landscape was somewhat unpredictable in 2025, AACI continued to build and nurture relationships with members of Congress through in-person meetings, letter campaigns, and personalized outreach.

We are deeply grateful to these congressional champions for their continued advocacy and support of cancer centers and biomedical research.

AACI continues to provide educational and networking opportunities to members through a robust calendar of events, including our flagship Clinical Research Innovation (CRI) and AACI/CCAF annual meetings, Catchment Area Data Excellence (CADEX) Conference, and Leadership Development Workshop. Preceding the 2025 AACI/CCAF Annual Meeting, AACI hosted a meeting for new cancer center directors and partnered with the American Cancer Society and the Cancer Center Network to host the Impact Summit.

Listserv discussions, webinars, and member surveys offered additional opportunities for professional growth. A partnership with Medlive enhanced our capacity to deliver high-quality educational content; thanks to this successful collaboration, AACI will now host its free webinars on the Medlive platform.

Though the past year has shown that the best laid plans can change at a moment's notice, it also strengthened AACI's ability to mobilize collective action. Looking ahead to 2026, we are excited to bring fresh perspectives to our programming, informed by our members' interests and priorities. As **Dr. Joann B. Sweasy**, director of Fred & Pamela Buffett Cancer Center, begins her first full year as AACI president, she will roll out a new presidential initiative dedicated to improving cancer outcomes in rural and frontier areas.

The cancer center community demonstrated remarkable strength and resilience in 2025, proving that working together is key to achieving our common goals. Thank you for all you do for patients and their loved ones. We are proud to be part of your community and look forward to collaborating with you in 2026.

Public Policy

Like our cancer center members, AACI was compelled to redirect time and other resources in response to significant shifts in the public policy landscape this year.

With AACI coordinating over 200 meetings on Capitol Hill, our outreach to Members of Congress and federal agencies was our greatest advocacy strength in 2025. Many of the meetings were led by AACI President **Dr. Robert A. Winn**, who repeatedly prioritized trips to Washington, DC, on behalf of AACI members.

In May, Dr. Winn and AACI Executive Director **Jennifer W. Pegher** met with the teams of **House Leader Steve Scalise (R-LA)**; **Speaker of the House Mike Johnson (R-LA)**; **Senate Appropriations Chair Susan Collins (R-ME)**; and **Senator Cindy Hyde-Smith (R-MS)**.

In addition, **Dr. Hannah Hazard-Jenkins**, director of WVU Cancer Institute, joined AACI in a conversation with **Sen. Shelley Moore Capito (R-WV)**.

Also in May, AACI Past President **Dr. Roy A. Jensen** and AACI staff joined lobbying firm EFB Advocacy in a meeting with the chief of staff for **Representative Tom Cole (R-OK)**. Later in the year, a small group of cancer center directors and AACI leadership met with the Center for Scientific Review.

In September, Dr. Winn was the keynote speaker for a Business for Federal Research Funding Roundtable, and he and AACI staff participated in meetings led by Pennsylvania Chamber of Commerce chapters on the importance of research funding for local economies. The month also saw AACI staff lead advocates in meetings during the Rally for Medical Research.

Public Policy



AACI/AACR Hill Day

AACI's 2025 Hill Day, co-hosted with the American Association for Cancer Research (AACR), drew more than 160 participants from 34 states – a significant increase compared to the previous year.

Hill Day events included a briefing at the U.S. Capitol Visitor Center, moderated by Dr. Winn with remarks by **Representative Deborah Wasserman Schultz (D-FL)**, **Drs. Roy Herbst and John Carpent**, and two cancer survivors. AACI and AACR also hosted 14 cancer survivor advocates who underscored the importance of continued funding for the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and National Cancer Institute (NCI).

At a reception the night before Hill Day, AACI presented its Cancer Research Ally Award to **Rep. Jamie Raskin (D-MD)** and **Senator Susan Collins (R-ME)**. In addition to AACI's ramped-up efforts in Washington, AACI continued its standard government relations activities, including monthly update calls for cancer centers and numerous advocacy letters on cancer-related policy issues.



Letters were sent to:

- U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary **Robert F. Kennedy, Jr.**, regarding the impact of cuts to medical research funding and the overall importance of cancer research
- NIH Director **Dr. Jay Bhattacharya**, signed by cancer center directors, regarding a proposal to move grant reviews to the Center for Scientific Review
- Republican Members of Congress, thanking them for signing a letter to the Office of Management and Budget urging timely and full disbursement of Fiscal Year (FY) 2025 appropriations for NIH
- **Senators Shelley Moore Capito (R-WV)** and **Tammy Baldwin (D-WI)**, thanking them for their support for NIH and NCI in the FY2026 Labor-HHS appropriations bill

AACI's main public policy focus continues to be strong federal funding for the NIH and the NCI. Work in 2025 included urging Congress to pass a robust FY2026 budget. In FY2025, NIH was funded at \$46.8 billion, a slight decline in support, and NCI was at \$7.22 billion, essentially flat.

New in 2025 was a "Congressional Connection" shared spreadsheet containing information on all 535 members of Congress, documenting their personal connections to cancer, committee assignments, and cancer advocacy history. AACI welcomes your advocacy ideas, and we encourage you to visit our Public Policy Resource Library to review legislative efforts that benefit cancer centers.

Presidential Initiatives



To address ongoing concerns and provide an open forum for directors, the initiative introduced AACI Cancer Center Director Town Hall Meetings in 2025. The meetings featured National Cancer Institute (NCI) personnel who provided updates and answered questions. Other guests included leaders from like-minded organizations and cancer advocates.

Participation was nearly evenly split by region of the country, with 92 cancer center directors, representing roughly 82 percent of AACI's members, joining the discussions.

Inclusive Excellence

For his Inclusive Excellence Initiative, AACI President **Dr. Robert A. Winn** focused on ways in which AACI members can foster and strengthen partnerships with other institutions and organizations regionally, nationally, and globally.

The initiative comprised five primary elements:

- Emerging and community cancer centers; Historically Black Colleges and Universities; Hispanic-Serving Institutions; and Minority-Serving Institutions
- Global Oncology
- Patient Navigation
- Enhanced partnerships
- Local, community initiatives

The 2025 AACI/CCAF Annual Meeting featured a discussion on global oncology. Moderator **Dr. Patrick J. Loehrer** and panelists **Drs. Julie Gralow, Kunle Odunsi, and Katherine Van Loon** shared the progress of the AACI Global Oncology Working Group, highlighting ways for cancer centers to build bidirectional, collaborative relationships to enact meaningful change on a global scale.



RURAL CANCER HEALTH INITIATIVE

Dr. Joann B. Sweasy's forthcoming Rural Cancer Health Initiative aims to identify best practices for improving cancer outcomes among rural populations.

In a presentation during the 2025 AACI/CCAF Annual Meeting, Dr. Sweasy noted that geography is an

often overlooked social determinant of health and individuals living in rural areas—roughly 14-20 percent of the United States population—generally experience higher rates of morbidity and mortality from cancer.

Leadership Development Workshop

The 2025 AACI Leadership Development Workshop, held in March, drew nearly 100 attendees, with 82 cancer centers represented. Attendees reflected the deep pool of talented emerging leaders at AACI cancer centers who are accelerating progress against cancer.

Keynote talks were delivered by **Dr. Karen Winkfield**, executive director, Meharry-Vanderbilt Alliance, and **Dr. Ted A. James**, cancer center medical director, Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center, Harvard Medical School. Dr. Winkfield spoke about the importance of crafting a career path that complements a person's life goals. Dr. James's talk, titled "Inclusive Team Building: Strategies for Cancer Center Leadership Excellence," considered ways to transform health care by promoting patient-centered care and fostering positive workplace culture.

The meeting's panel discussions included insights on navigating the pathway to cancer center leadership, with **Dr. Brian Gonzalez**, Moffitt Cancer Center; **Dr. Wendy Law**, Fred Hutch Cancer Center; **Dr. Yolanda Sanchez**, director and CEO of the University of New Mexico Comprehensive Cancer Center; and **Dr. Tamara Watts**, Duke Cancer Institute.

Impact Summit

Co-hosted by AACI, American Cancer Society, and the Cancer Center Network, the Impact Summit gathered cancer center leaders, researchers, and key stakeholders for a dynamic event focused on strengthening the future of cancer center leadership and workforce development. More than 100 registrants from 72 AACI cancer centers attended the summit, which was held in conjunction with the AACI/CCAF annual meeting.

Sessions addressed how national organizations are shaping the biomedical workforce; developing the next generation of cancer center faculty; and faculty recruitment and retention.

In closing remarks, **Dr. Wendy Law**, Fred Hutch Cancer Center, urged attendees to take action after the meeting, perhaps by reaching out to a potential collaborator, launching a mentorship initiative, or simply taking new perspectives back to their centers. She noted that small steps, multiplied many times, become real change.

Meetings

17th Annual AACI CRI Meeting

With the theme of *Driving Solutions Together*, the 17th Annual AACI CRI Meeting, held in June, drew over 600 registrants, including 578 in-person attendees.

CRI Steering Committee Chair **Dr. Thomas J. George**, of UF Health Cancer Institute, welcomed attendees and introduced keynote speaker, **Loriana Hernández-Aldama**, a two-time cancer survivor and founder of ArmorUp for LIFE®. Hernández-Aldama challenged the audience to recognize that every data point has a face, a family, and a future.

Panel discussions looked at the restructuring of the National Cancer Institute's (NCI) Cancer Center Support Grant (CCSG) submission and review processes; shaping career paths in oncology; and clinical trial portfolio management.

CRI Steering Committee Chair-elect **Dr. Margaret "Margie" Kasner**, of Sidney Kimmel Comprehensive Cancer Center at Jefferson, moderated a session on navigating investigator-initiated trials. Another session featured four AACI Corporate Roundtable members sharing how corporate partnerships can align with cancer center initiatives to improve clinical trials.

2025 AACI/CCAF Annual Meeting

In a year that repeatedly tested the resolve of cancer center leaders, researchers, and staff as they absorbed mixed signals from Washington and uncertainty about the future of federal funding, nearly 400 cancer center directors and administrators, representing 95 AACI member cancer centers, gathered in the nation's capital for the 2025 AACI/CCAF Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting commenced with a comprehensive update of AACI's programs, initiatives, and finances, with outgoing President **Dr. Robert A. Winn** urging attendees to take action. Taking inspiration from a quote attributed to iconic reggae artist Bob Marley, Dr. Winn said, “Our communities, families, future leaders, and future scientists are depending on us to be strong – at this point, it is our only choice.”

Former, current, and future AACI presidents put many of today's challenges in perspective, describing how cancer centers have coped with economic recessions, federal funding cuts, and other crises. The discussion was co-moderated by **Drs. Joann B. Sweasy** and **Robert A. Winn** with panelists **Drs. H. Shelton Earp, Roy A. Jensen, Michelle Le Beau, and George J. Weiner**. They stressed the value of educating local and national legislators and forging partnerships with other cancer centers and organizations in their communities. The conversation highlighted decades of progress in cancer research and the panelists' unwavering dedication to eradicating cancer. “No one here has a job,” Dr. Jensen said. “We have a mission.”

Keynote speaker **Chris Draft**, a lung cancer advocate and former NFL linebacker, challenged attendees to make sure that the general public and elected officials know that research matters, and to tackle that task as “one team” with “one fight,” not as individual cancer leaders or organizations.

The program also included a Q&A with Dr. Winn, AACI Executive Director **Jennifer W. Pegher**, and **Katie Brown**, legislative director and chief counsel for **Senator Susan Collins (R-ME)**. Brown shared insights into the government shutdown, the implications for funding priorities and federal operations, and potential paths forward. The Q&A was followed by a conversation about the intersection of medicine, politics, and media, featuring **Paul Goldberg**, editor of *The Cancer Letter*; **Laurie McGinley**, a board member for the recently established Patient Action for Cancer Research and a journalist who covered health care policy for *The Washington Post*; and **Dr. George J. Weiner**, director emeritus of Holden Comprehensive Cancer Center, University of Iowa.

Due to the government shutdown, speakers from the National Cancer Institute (NCI) were unable to participate in the meeting, and an October 22 retreat for directors of NCI-Designated Cancer Centers was canceled. Fortunately, AACI responded quickly to fill the gap and hosted a two-hour meeting for cancer center directors after the sessions concluded.

The 2026 AACI/CCAF Annual Meeting is set for October 25-27 at the Marriott Chicago Downtown Magnificent Mile. The 2026 Impact Summit, Leadership Development Workshop, and New Cancer Center Directors Meeting will run concurrently at the same location on October 24.

2025 AACI Catchment Area Data Excellence (CAEx) Conference

The 2025 AACI CAEx Conference convened in January in Coronado, CA. Participants included cancer center catchment area data scientists, geospatial statisticians, and other experts, who addressed emerging topics in cancer prevention and control analytics.

The conference opened with a keynote by **Dr. Jeremy Warner**, “A Brief History of EHRs and the Importance of Interoperability,” supported by **Simmons Comprehensive Cancer Center, UT Southwestern Medical Center**. His presentation included a historical overview of health records and mapped out their possible evolution, highlighting the importance of interoperability in health care.

Panel discussion topics covered geospatial tools, catchment area surveillance, and other aspects of data gathering, analysis, and dissemination.

A closing session, shared with the Impact Summit, highlighted the power of collaboration to drive progress. Panelists were former NCI Director **Dr. W. Kimryn Rathmell**, AACI President **Dr. Robert A. Winn**, and cancer center directors **Dr. John D. Carpten**, City of Hope Comprehensive Cancer Center, and **Dr. Yolanda Sanchez**, University of New Mexico Comprehensive Cancer Center. **Dr. Wendy Law** moderated.

The 2025 AACI/CCAF Annual Meeting featured award presentations recognizing excellence in scientific achievement, health equity, cancer-focused philanthropy, and public service. The awards ceremonies allowed AACI members to express their gratitude for their peers in the cancer center community and for cancer research advocates. With cancer research funding and health equity initiatives under threat, the 2025 awards held special significance.

The 2025 Distinguished Scientist Award was presented to **Dr. Thomas F. Gajewski**, The University of Chicago Medicine Comprehensive Cancer Center. Dr. Gajewski expressed gratitude for being recognized by his peers before highlighting his work in developing immunotherapies to treat melanoma and other cancers.

Dr. John D. Carpten, director of the City of Hope Comprehensive Cancer Center, received the **2025 AACI Cancer Health Equity Award**. The award was presented by Dr. Robert A. Winn in honor of Dr. Carpten's pioneering research in genome science and health disparities and his deep commitment to justice, representation, and opportunity in medicine and science.

Dr. Candace Johnson, president and CEO of Roswell Park Comprehensive Cancer Center, presented the **2025 Champion for Cures Award** to the 11 Day Power Play, an organization that has contributed more than \$7 million to research and wellness programs at the cancer center and supports other cancer programs in and around Buffalo, NY.

Established in 2021, TGHCI is the result of the strategic and synergistic partnership in cancer care and research between Tampa General Hospital, a 991-bed, nonprofit, academic health system, and the University of South Florida (USF) Health Morsani College of Medicine. USF is a high-impact research university dedicated to community engagement that generates hundreds of millions of dollars in research activity each year.



Eduardo M. Sotomayor, MD, is vice president and executive director of the cancer institute. Dr. Sotomayor is a physician-scientist in cancer immunology and lymphoma research; former standing member of the National Cancer Institute (NCI), Subcommittee A; and a former member of AACI's Board of Directors. He was previously the director of GW Cancer Center.

By working with its primary care network across the Tampa Bay region and through its strong partnership with USF College of Nursing and its comprehensive community outreach and



engagement portfolio, the cancer institute is addressing unmet cancer care needs in its catchment area, with a particular focus in rural communities. Future goals for the cancer institute include NCI designation within its first decade.

UMass Memorial Health (UMMH) Cancer Center



UMass Memorial Health (UMMH) Cancer Center joined the association in December. It is led by

David Cachia, MD, interim chief of Hematology Oncology Services and associate professor of neuro-oncology at the University of Massachusetts. The cancer center is comprised of four research programs: Cancer and Cell Biology, Cancer Genetics, Translational Oncology, and Cancer Population Health Sciences that span basic, translational, clinical, and population science. Partnering with the UMass Chan Medical School, the cancer center combines state-of-the-art technologies to diagnose, treat, and monitor cancers with compassionate care in a multispecialty, collaborative setting.



Approximately 88 percent of patients seen by UMMH Cancer Center in the past 10 years reside in the Central Massachusetts catchment area, which encompasses 8 counties, 104 zip codes, and 2.5 million people who mirror the state's racial and ethnic makeup. UMMH Cancer Center is committed to providing exceptional patient care while conducting cutting-edge research at the highest level.

The cancer center is dedicated to fostering the next generation of cancer researchers, educators, clinicians, and physician-scientists through education and training for students and trainees at various career stages, particularly those from groups underrepresented in the biomedical sciences. Programs focus on fields including cancer genetics, hematology-oncology, screening and diagnosis, and population health science.

Member Services & Education

Surveys

AACI surveys are designed to gather critical insights, facilitate knowledge sharing, and enhance the collective impact of member cancer centers.

In 2026, through a partnership with Admininformatics, AACI will introduce a new survey tool to streamline data collection and allow members to view data summaries in real time.

Surveys launched in 2025:

- **Cancer Center Efficiencies Survey**

This survey is gathering input from cancer center leaders to identify operational processes and expenses—such as clinical trial workflows, contracting, feasibility, and care pathways—that could be streamlined to enhance efficiency. Results will be shared with membership in 2026.

- **Clinical Trials Office (CTO) Benchmarking Survey**

AACI expanded the 2024 survey from 17 to 21 questions to capture additional insights into trial and staffing workloads, sponsor distribution, activation timelines, accruals, center analytic case volume, trial demographics, and financial support sources. An optional 11-question module on participant support programs was also included. Seventy-seven percent of AACI cancer centers completed the survey, which will be conducted annually.







Listservs

AACI listservs allow members to network with peers and pose questions about specific topics or roles. Roundtable meetings, webinars, and other projects have been developed from robust listserv discussions.

Listservs are for AACI members only. Subscribers must have a cancer center email address to join.

Associate Directors for Clinical Research (ADCR)

Like the clinical trials office (CTO) medical and administrative director listservs, this listserv offers a platform for ADCRs to network, mentor, and openly discuss their roles. Only ADCRs may join (typically, one from each center).

Catchment Area Research Data Science (CARDS)

This listserv provides a forum for members to make announcements and seek collaboration on topics related to catchment area research and data science.

Clinical Research Innovation (CRI)

The CRI listserv is AACI's largest and most active listserv, with more than 1,200 members from 90 AACI cancer centers. It is a valuable resource for all CTO staff to discuss best practices for clinical research.

CTO Medical Directors

This role-based listserv provides a forum for CTO medical directors, creating opportunities for members to mentor other medical directors. Only CTO medical directors or those with a similar job title may join (typically, one from each center), but exceptions can be made at AACI's discretion.

CTO Administrative Directors

This listserv allows CTO administrative directors to share best practices and benefit from mentorship. Up to three CTO administrative directors from each cancer center may join. Additional cancer center subscriptions may be requested.

Clinical Trials Reporting Program (CTRP) Administrators

This listserv facilitates discussions among CTRP administrators or similarly titled positions at various institutions.

Community Outreach and Engagement (COE)

Members frequently share webinars, seminars, and in-person events that support various aspects of COE within their cancer centers' catchment areas.

Multicenter Investigator Initiated Trials (MIIT)

New in 2025, this listserv provides a forum for MIIT staff to share their models, templates, and challenges. Members can ask questions and collaborate to solve common problems.

PRM/DSM Committees

Discussions focus on Protocol Review and Monitoring (PRM) and Data and Safety Monitoring (DSM) topics, such as structure, benchmarking, and responsibilities related to the role of these committees within cancer center research departments.

Programs & Initiatives

AACI's initiatives and programs provide platforms for advancing the objectives of cancer centers and offer numerous opportunities for interactions with AACI and among cancer center leaders and staff.

Clinical Research Innovation

Cancer clinical trials play a crucial role in prevention, early detection, treatment, and, ultimately, cancer cures. Recognizing that clinical trials in the U.S. face administrative and staffing barriers, regulatory constraints, increasing costs, and lagging patient accrual, AACI established the Clinical Research Initiative (CRI) in 2009, later renaming the program Clinical Research Innovation.

CURRENT PROJECTS

CTO Benchmarking Working Group

In 2025, the working group continued to analyze results from its 2024 survey, reporting high-level findings at the 17th Annual Clinical Research Innovation (CRI) Meeting and sharing them with survey respondents. A revised survey will be distributed in 2026 to collect 2025 data.

Clinical Trials Management System Task Force

This task force meets quarterly to provide updates among members about changes and upgrades to the OnCore platform, as well as challenges and solutions related to the transition to cloud-based storage.

CTO Medical Directors Forum, CTO Administrative Directors Forum, and Associate Directors of Clinical Research Forum

The CTO administrative and medical directors continue to hold roundtables every other month and hold joint discussions quarterly. The Associate Directors of Clinical Research Forum meets quarterly.

Corporate Roundtable Stipends and Reimbursement Task Force members continued meeting with the Equitable Access to Clinical Trials (EACT) project, adding optional questions to the CTO benchmarking survey to collect data on programs and resources, available through cancer centers, that make funding available to patients to cover trial-related expenses. A new publication, *Best Practices Guide for Clinical Trial Site Personnel*, which includes the survey data, was shared on AACI listservs and at the 2025 AACI/CCAF Annual Meeting.

NEW PROJECTS IN 2025

Artificial Intelligence (AI) Task Force

Launched in November, the AI Task Force examines how sites can responsibly and effectively integrate artificial intelligence into clinical trials, operations, and patient care. The task force will meet monthly, focusing on topics like governance, implementation barriers, and operational and workflow realities.

Trial Activation Working Group

This working group was formed to identify the top three challenges that cancer centers face when activating clinical trials, initially focusing on pre-activation protocol amendments. Data from a short survey are being evaluated to identify ways that corporate partners can work together to speed up trial enrollment.

Unused Lab Kit Supplies Task Force

This group is developing unused lab kit supply disposal policies and drafting recommendations for use across sites to increase sustainability and reduce waste.

AACI Financial Disclosures and Conflict Management Task Force

The task force is using survey data to develop a template for centers to use when declaring financial disclosures.

Protocol Review and Monitoring (PRM) and Data and Safety Monitoring (DSM) committees

More than 60 participants joined discussions every other month regarding clinical trial site challenges.

Physician Clinical Leadership Initiative (PCLI)

PCLI's 13th annual meeting, held during the AACI/CCAF annual meeting, featured a panel discussion on protected academic time, highlighting preliminary results from a survey conducted by the PCLI Steering Committee. The session was moderated by **Dr. Karen Reckamp**, with panelists **Drs. Randall Holcombe, Thomas J. George, Jr., Gail Eckhardt**, and **Claire Verschraegen** (see photo below).

In September, the steering committee published "Benchmarking the Current Landscape: Insights from an Association of American Cancer Institutes Survey on Academic Cancer Service Lines," in *JCO Oncology Practice*. **Drs. Karen L. Reckamp, Carrie Lee, Paula Fracasso, Nicole Simone, and Thomas J. George** revised the 2018 AACI Protected Time Survey and are finalizing the manuscript for publication.

Cellular Therapy Initiative (CTI)

The CTI Steering Committee developed and shared the 2025 Non-malignant Clinical Trials Using IEC Therapy Survey with AACI's membership. A manuscript is being drafted for publication.

The CTI steering committee collaborated with Medlive to produce two CME-accredited educational programs in 2025 on CAR T-cell therapy. The steering committee continues to partner with the Association of Community Cancer Centers (ACCC) and the American Society for Transplantation and Cellular Therapy (ASTCT) on projects and publications.

2025 AACI CRI Virtual Roundtables:

- **Training & Onboarding in Clinical Research:** This two-part series provided effective training methods and onboarding strategies for new research staff.
- **IgniteData | EHR to EDC:** AACI Tech Gold Member IgniteData partnered with AACI cancer centers to highlight EHR-to-EDC integration through their platform.
- **Disease Group Tokens:** Members shared approaches to disease group tokens, including on-ramp/lane systems, activation capacity alignment, and trial allocation models.
- **Clinical Trial Software Matching:** Centers discussed tools and systems used to match patients to clinical trials.
- **Unused Lab Kit Supplies:** Centers exchanged sustainable lab kit disposal practices, leading to an AACI task force and membership-wide recommendations.

AACI President

AACI's new president is **Dr. Joann B. Sweasy**, director of the Fred & Pamela Buffett Cancer Center at the University of Nebraska and the Eppley Institute for Research in Cancer and Allied Diseases. She succeeds **Dr. Robert A. Winn**, director of VCU Massey Comprehensive Cancer Center, and officially began her two-year term at the close of the 2025 AACI/CCAF Annual Meeting in October.

Dr. Sweasy was appointed to AACI's board in 2021. From 2020-2023, she served as director of the University of Arizona Cancer Center and previously was a member of the Yale Cancer Center for 26 years. During her Yale career, Dr. Sweasy rose from assistant professor to the Ensign Professor of Therapeutic Radiology. She also served as the associate director of basic sciences and as co-leader of the Radiobiology and Radiotherapy Program at Yale.

Dr. Sweasy is an internationally recognized expert in the genetics, cell biology, and biochemistry of DNA repair. Dr. Sweasy has extensive experience as an NCI reviewer and has served as a member of NCI Subcommittee A since 2017.

Dr. Cornelia Ulrich has been elected to serve as vice president/president-elect of AACI's Board of Directors. She is chief scientific officer and executive director of the Comprehensive Cancer Center at Huntsman Cancer Institute at the University of Utah.



Communications & Publications



AACI's 2025 communications focused on policy decisions that impact cancer centers and patients, with numerous press releases, statements, and social media posts highlighting the value of federal investment in the National Institutes of Health and National Cancer Institute.

To expand awareness of the very real benefits of federally funded research, AACI launched its Defending Cancer Research digest in March, with nine issues published in 2025. The digest includes stories from around the country about ways that patients, advocates and cancer center leaders are speaking out on behalf of cancer research.

AACI shared these and other stories about the value of cancer research on social media with the hashtag #DefendingCancerResearch.

Also in 2025, AACI expanded its social media footprint and increased activity on YouTube, featuring videos from meetings, conferences, and webinars, as well as interviews with cancer research advocates.

These new efforts complemented our long-standing monthly newsletter, AACI Update, and AACI Commentary, an editorial platform for cancer center leaders and subject matter experts. Both publications are emailed to more than 7,000 readers and are posted on AACI's website.

In 2025, the AACI Commentary highlighted patient advocacy, oncology workforce and leadership training, and of course, the desperate need for sustained and sufficient federal funding for cancer research.

Edward Chu, MD, MMS

December 19, 1958 – November 13, 2025

Montefiore Einstein Comprehensive Cancer Center (MECCC) Director Dr. Edward “Ed” Chu died in November of glioblastoma. He was an expert in pharmacology, performing research that improved therapies for colorectal cancer, leading to the identification of new treatment targets and driving scientific advances in the field.

Dr. Chu was elected to the AACI Board of Directors in 2023 and was deeply committed to AACI’s mission and purpose, serving on the board with exceptional dedication, insight, and integrity.

He had a distinguished career as a physician-scientist, holding tenured positions and leadership roles at Yale School of Medicine and Yale Cancer Center, and University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine, where he was chief of hematology-oncology and deputy director of the UPMC Hillman Cancer Center.

Dr. Chu joined MECCC in the fall of 2020. During his tenure, he transformed the cancer center into a fully integrated, unified cancer enterprise, resulting in its first comprehensive designation from the National Cancer Institute. In addition to his role as director of MECCC, Dr. Chu was vice president of cancer medicine and the Carol and Roger Einiger Professor of Cancer Medicine, and he acted as interim chair of the department of oncology until 2024.

Revered by colleagues for her inspiring leadership, Julie Brabbs joined the University of Michigan Rogel Cancer Center as chief administrative officer in 2016. She began her career at Pfizer before spending 17 years at the University of Michigan.

She was appointed to AACI’s Clinical Research Innovation steering committee in 2022 and served on the Finance and Investment Committee, the planning committee for the DEI Summit in 2024, and as a panelist and moderator at AACI meetings. 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
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
